2/3 September

For university research in Scotland to be recognised as of international class HEIs may need to pool resources and compete for funds externally rather than internally. What are the prospects, opportunities and risks in different disciplines and institutions and their RAE profile? What mechanisms could be employed? And what lessons are there for institutions in England, Wales and Northern Ireland?

2. PhD Supervision: developing best practice

16/17 September, 11.00 am start

Future funding of postgraduate research programmes is to be limited to those with trained supervisors. This seminar provides an opportunity for supervisors, and those providing training for them, to share in the examination of current problems and the development of good practice. Special attention can be paid to CASE awards and engaging experienced supervisors in training programmes.

3. Postgraduate Research Programmes: adopting the new QAA Code of Practice

14/15 October

The new QAA Code to be published in September will be used by funding bodies in England, Scotland and Wales to inform funding decisions, as from 2006 (2005 in England). This seminar will provide the first opportunity for all those responsible to examine, under Chatham House Rules and with members of the QAA Working Group, the implications of the Code for their own programmes and institutions.

4. Quality and Standards: providing information for the new TQI web site 21/22 October

All English HEIs are now loading information on the quality and standards of their teaching on to the UK HE TQI site which will be displayed alongside data provided by a national survey and by HESA. The site will be fully launched in summer 2005. What are the political and technical problems for HEIs in this process? How can institutions take advantage of this facility to help with recruitment and retention?

5. Collaboration, FDL and e-learning: opportunities and risks and implementing the new QAA code

QAA Annual Report 2002–03. Participants are invited to share the practical issues raised by collaboration, FDL and e-learning, and the implications of the new QAA Code of Practice.

6. Positioning your faculty, school and institution: the leagues, fee – and research – strategies

'You will need a clear-sighted understanding of what your market is and where you stand in relation to your market. A lot of your strategic decisions will flow from that. We worry that some institutions may get this wrong.....
