#### EVALUATION OF HEALTH PROGRAMMES IN COMPLEX EMERGENCIES

This innovative course will provide an introduction to the theory, practice and methodologies required for the evaluation of health sector interventions in situations characterized as conflict induced humanitarian emergencies. It will take place at the London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine from 17 - 21 September 2001.

The course is co-ordinated by Dr Egbert Sondorp and Dr Tania Kaiser of the Conflict and Health Programme (Health Policy Unit, Department of Public Health & Policy). The course is part of a joint LSHTM / Merlin initiative to enhance the "Evidence Base for Humanitarian Aid". It will be taught by staff members of the School and outside experts in the fields of evaluation, health programme implementation and humanitarian assistance.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Until fairly recently, evaluations of humanitarian assistance programmes were relatively rare. Concerns about the quality of the humanitarian response to the crisis in Rwanda and its aftermath precipitated recognition of the need for such assessment. The subsequent evaluation undertaken there was influential in developing and testing appropriate methodologies. Evaluation methods continue to evolve to meet the specific challenges of humanitarian programming. These include the need to assess agency performance in challenging circumstances and to utilize varied criteria to address complex issues such as protection. One concern is the extent to which beneficiary participation is an often stated, but rarely implemented component of evaluation processes. Another is the need to incorporate mechanisms of lesson learning as well as upward and downward accountability.

The gradual increase in the number and sophistication of humanitarian evaluations implies a demand for evaluators with relevant skills in evaluation and health sector interventions in the humanitarian context. Since a combination of these skills is still relatively rare, this Short Course aims to increase the number of people available to perform such evaluations. By these means we hope to contribute to increased learning capacity within the humanitarian system.

#### WHO SHOULD ATTEND?

This course has a dual focus; it offers instruction in practical evaluation tools as well as exploring some of the unresolved challenges of humanitarian assistance evaluation. It examines alternative approaches to evaluation and learning in the context of health programmes, and invites participants to share and debate their experiences. Informed by the latest thinking and experience in the fields of emergency health intervention and evaluation, the focus is on improving understanding and using this knowledge as a basis for change.

Field experience in humanitarian work is required. Applications would be welcome from health professionals who want to upgrade their evaluation skills. The course will also be relevant to evaluators with non-health sectoral specialisms. The course will be receptive to the expressed needs

and interests of registered participants. The number of participants will be limited to facilitate group work. Competence in English must be assured.

### **COURSE CONTENT**

- An introduction to evaluation in emergency situations
- Evaluation and the project cycle; planning, choosing methods and incorporating lessons learned
- Evaluation criteria; humanitarian principles and the differences between work in emergency and non-emergency situations
- Evaluation, accountability and international standards for health; codes of conduct, the Sphere project, the Humanitarian Accountability Project
- Impact assessment and the unintended consequences of programming
- The need for participative approaches; involving beneficiaries / health service users
- Humanitarian assistance and its relationship to national and local health care systems
- Health sector interventions in context; the role of governments, donors, warring parties, organisations of civil society
- Data collection methodologies; qualitative and quantitative approaches, involving stakeholders and other key actors
- The human resource and other requirements of evaluation at different levels; project, programme, organisational, policy, system wide
- Analysis, interpretation, dissemination and use of evaluation findings

#### TEACHING METHODS

Teaching will be through a combination of lectures, discussions, seminars and informal workshops, involving group work and practical sessions.

Course notes and reference material will be provided at the start of the course. There will be no formal examination, but a Certificate of Attendance will be issued to those completing the course.

#### **COURSE FEE**

The total course fee is £650. The fee covers participation in the course, course materials, lunch on the first day and tea/coffee, but does not cover travel costs or accommodation. The full course fee is payable on notification of acceptance for the course and must be paid before 31 August 2001.
