Background

The Centre for Research in Lifelong Learning (CRLL), the Institute of Lifelong Learning, Queen's University Belfast and the University of Stirling's Division of Academic Innovation and Continuing Education (DAICE) are pleased to announce the 11th Scottish Forum on Lifelong Learning and ALPINE Project Dissemination European Conference on the topic 'Increasing Adult Education in European Universities: Perspectives on Policy and Practice in the New Europe'. Please note that all presentations will be conducted in English.

Scottish Forum on Lifelong Learning

CRLL is a joint initiative between Glasgow Caledonian University and the Institute of Education, University of Stirling. The Scottish Forum on Lifelong Learning is designed to provide a context in which members of the research, policy and provider community involved with lifelong learning can meet together to explore key issues.

What is ALPINE?

ALPINE is a European Union Socrates (Grundtvig) funded project which has been examining existing provisions for adults in European universities, and is seeking to highlight ways in which these provisions might be improved, and participation widened to include new groups of adult learners.

A total of 34 partners from 20 countries, including 10 partners from Central and Eastern Europe, have researched the nature and extent of university adult education within their own countries, achieving together an extensive European survey, to be published in the course of 2004.

The partners have also worked together since May 2001, to produce a manual of good practice that will provide case studies across Europe. The manual will be available electronically, and will illustrate how some universities have found inclusive and innovative solutions to increase participation from adults.

<u>Aims</u>

The conference aims to offer an interactive platform to explore the findings of the project, especially through workshops, which will reflect the project's thematic groups: curriculum and adults; retaining non-traditional adult learners; the role of academic learning support; community outreach and ICT; the role of universities in reaching

socially excluded groups; teaching, learning and adults; languages and adult education. Keynote speakers and workshop leaders will include researchers and practitioners from the field of Lifelong Learning across Europe.
