## LAUNCH OF THE PARANOIA NETWORK

The Paranoia Network was launched in Barnsley UK with meetings over 10th, 11th and 12th of November 2003. These meetings brought together ideas from users and survivors of services as well as from clinicians and academics. Its history can be traced back at least through the experience and debates of the last fifteen years of the development of the Hearing Voices Network (HVN) and it continues in that ethos of creating safe spaces for the development of new knowledge and new ways of speaking. Specifically it is based on the achievements of the Sheffield Paranoia Group which has met weekly since March, convened by Peter Bullimore, Jenny Cawthorne and Chris Molloy, and on the research project of Tamasin Knight in Exeter - all of whom are also founding members of Asylum Associates.
