Nordic and International Urban Morphology: Distinctive and Common Themes

3rd – 5th September 2006

Co-sponsored with the International Seminar on Urban Form (ISUF)

Urban morphology is the field of architectural and built form research, which has gained immense international recognition and respect. Urban form has always been, and still is, in the focus of the development of knowledge on the city, consisting of both cognitive and normative theories. The growing international interest in urban morphology as an interdisciplinary field of research led in the mid 1990s to the establishment of the *International Seminar on Urban Form* (ISUF). It is within the frame of ISUF activities and its promotion for the creation of regional entities of urban morphology that the *Nordic Network of Urban Morphology* (NNUM) was recently formalized. The NNUM seeks to promote typological and morphological studies of the Nordic built environment, and this by organizing Nordic and International conferences and PhD courses.

In association with ISUF, the Nordic Network of Urban Morphology is now organizing its first Nordic and international conference with the title *Nordic and International Urban Morphology: Distinctive and Common Themes.* The conference will be held in Stockholm at the Royal Institute of Technology, Main Library and the School of Architecture 3-5 September 2006. It is expected that the conference will showcase current research and practice in urban morphology being done in the Nordic countries, as well as highlight the latest work from international centres.

The emergence of urban morphology as a field of research in the Nordic context can be dated to the early 1990s. Studies in urban morphology here have been generally accomplished in the schools of architecture as individual research programme and research projects without any established links of cooperation and exchange between researchers. The need of coming together for more efficient communication is required to advance international and interdisciplinary research.

By organizing the conference *Nordic and International Urban Morphology: Distinctive and Common Themes*, the NNUM aims at giving the Nordic urban morphologists the opportunity to

present, discuss and compare their research to the international work in the field. In addition to the academic sessions and panels, a special morphological excursion through selected areas of Stockholm will be offered.

Proposed themes

The NNUM invites urban morphologists, from the Nordic region as well as from other international centres, to submit proposals in the following themes:

- 1- Urban morphology as a field of inquiry.
- 2- The twentieth century urban form.
- 3- Sustainable urban form
- 4- Townscape management
- 5- Echoes of modern Nordic urban developments in other countries
- 6- Green forms in urban areas
- 7- Water as part of urban morphology

Proposals

Proposals should have the following format: name of author(s), affiliation, postal address, email address, telephone number, fax number, title of the paper and an abstract of about 250 words. The deadline for the receipt of proposals is 19th May 2006.

The number of places at the conference will be limited and acceptance of attendance will be on the first come, first served basis. Placement on the programme will be communicated to applicants by 26th June 2006, and will be contingent upon advance registration. Full paper will have to be submitted by 1st August.

Organisation

The conference will be held at main library of the Royal Institute of Technology 3-5 September 2006. The conference venue is the recently renovated main library of the Royal Institute of Technology. The main library is a modern research library with facilities for working in a beautiful surrounding. The library café is a meeting place for students and teachers. The Entrance hall is used for receptions and exhibitions.
