

How Proud is Our Nation? An Open Invitation to the Museums Sector

I am writing to initiate a dialogue exploring the exciting possibilities ahead, and to invite your participation in an unprecedented mapping exercise.

Proud Heritage is the new national agency for lesbian, gay, bisexual and trans (LGBT) history, heritage and lived experience. Our goal is to create a national museum at first online and then as a physical institution, reflecting the diverse experiences of LGBT people across the country and through time. Proud Heritage will be driving a shift in culture, both amongst LGBT people and within the heritage sector.

Above all, we recognise two fundamentals: firstly, that our work must be sustainable in business terms over the very long term; secondly, that we need to explore all potential models of joint-working to achieve our ambitious vision.

After 18 months of careful planning — involving a core group of leading archivists, artists, business people, communicators, curators, educators, historians and writers — we are now entering a critical phase, with the launch of the Proud Nation Survey. Our aim is to establish the first listing of the distributed national collection of LGBT-related holdings in British museums, libraries and archives.

Backed by both Museum sector agencies (MDA and the MLA Council) and LGBT community bodies like Stonewall and Outrage, this is the first part of the PROUD NATION strand of our work. It will ultimately deliver an online information system that catalogues every LGBT holding in the country and links them to audio or video clips, images, scanned documents and other information, and where people are encouraged to donate memories, images or artefacts about their lives or places/people they remember.

Next month this will be joined by strands developing innovative partnerships in local history (Walking Proud in Britain) and collective memory (Proud Memories) — please contact me for an advance briefing and to explore collaboration in the next two years.

In this initial stage, we are distributing the Proud Nation Survey through sector partners as well as directly through Museums Journal. You may already have received a copy. All you have to do is complete the response form enclosed. We hope it won't take too much of your time.

We want to know if you hold any original documents, objects, recordings or other items, such as books, journals/monographs. We recognise that sometimes even mass-produced objects or publications are of interest because of their provenance.

We would encourage you to look at your holdings with fresh eyes in order to fully assess what might be relevant amongst your collection. There may also be confidentiality or language issues. We are here to assist you on these matters. Remember, please complete the survey even if you feel you hold nothing relevant, because establishing the extent of LGBT visibility/invisibility will help inform policy-making and future activity for the sector as a whole.

We are also asking if you could estimate how much of such material requires full cataloguing. We recognise how difficult it is to resource cataloguing. That is why one of the projects we will be seeking to facilitate will be to assist partner institutions in the full cataloguing of their current LGBT-related holdings.

In the meantime, we plan to publish the data gleaned from this exercise, unless an institution requests us not to make public their information, with a web link to each organisation with

holdings. Ultimately, the information will also form the core of the Proud Nation online system described above. We also plan to list accredited institutions who do not respond.

Please return the response form as soon as possible. Let me know if you feel you need more than six weeks from receipt in order to respond in full.
