

## Photocopying and scanning from magazines, books, journals and other periodicals under the CLA Licence in England

With effect from 1 April 2006

CLA's Licence authorises photocopying and distribution of Paper Copies and the scanning and distribution of Digital Copies by email via the NHSnet or other secure internal email system

### Works included in the licence

#### Photocopying

- magazines, books, journals and other periodicals published in Argentina, Australia, Austria, Belgium, Canada (including Quebec), Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hong Kong, Iceland, Ireland, Jamaica, Luxembourg, the Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Singapore, South Africa, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland and the UK
- works published in the United States of America (a list of American publishers covered by the CLA licence is available nearby or from your Licensing Co-ordinator\* or see CLA website: [www.cla.co.uk](http://www.cla.co.uk))

#### Scanning

- UK publications only
- copies can only be made from an original published paper edition owned by the NHS or from a copyright fee-paid copy supplied by a licensed document supplier such as the British Library or a CLA licensed press cuttings agency

### Who can make and receive copies?

Copies may be made for internal NHS information purposes as follows:

#### Paper Copies

All staff, general practitioners employed by or contracted to the NHS, individuals providing consultancy services to the NHS and members of the public known as 'non-executive members' who sit on a Designated Committee

Patients and carers or guardians of patients may also be provided with a single Paper Copy in connection with their treatment and/or condition

#### Digital Copies

As above, provided that these staff and contracted individuals are permitted by the NHS to have access to the NHSnet or other internal email system via a secure login process which verifies their authority

### Copying authorised by the licence

You can make and distribute as many copies as you require for each particular purpose subject to the following extent limit:

| ■ any number of articles in a periodical dealing with a particular theme where a substantial part of the issue is dedicated to that theme | ■ one chapter from a book   |

### Restrictions on Digital Copies

Digital Copies may not be edited or manipulated in any way and may not be stored on a central server or systematically indexed with the intention of creating an electronic library or corporate information resource. Copies may not be placed on, or linked to the world wide web or an Intranet
