## Families of Individuals with Intellectual Disabilities or Autism: Reflections, and Current Issues

This half day conference is designed to showcase research about families of children with learning disabilities or autism that has been carried out in Wales. Dr Stuart Todd (Cardiff University) will describe results from his programme of research about parents' caring careers, and members of the research team from the School of Psychology at Bangor University will describe results from some of their latest family research. We are also delighted to welcome Dr Laraine Glidden, Professor of Psychology at St Marys College Maryland USA, who has conducted a 20-year long study of parents who adopted children with disabilities.

The conference will be useful for people from a variety of backgrounds, including parents and other family members, service managers and commissioners, psychologists, health professionals, workers in education and employment, social workers, voluntary sector workers, health visitors, and researchers.

### 2.00 When does it begin and when does it end? Caring careers of parents of individuals with intellectual disabilities

Stuart Todd, Welsh Centre for Learning Disabilities, Cardiff University

Dr Todd will describe the results of his programme of research on parents' caring career, with a focus on the development of caring over time including the issues associated with the end of the caring role when an individual with intellectual disabilities dies.

Tracey will describe results from her current research, which is focused on why or how some parents may struggle to cope with the demands of raising a child with significant disabilities. Her research includes study of variables including acceptance, locus of control, and hope.

Mike will describe results from interview-based research with siblings in middle childhood and also in adolescence. These siblings were asked to describe what it is like growing up with an individual with autism.

# 4.00 - 5.00 Predicting Resilience and Vulnerability in Adoptive and Birth Parents of Children with Developmental Disabilities

Laraine Glidden, St Mary's College, Maryland, USA

Dr Glidden will describe a 20-year longitudinal study of parents who have adopted or birthed children with developmental disabilities, focusing on family characteristics that lead to resilience or vulnerability. Her results indicate that adjustment and adaptation over time are the result of many factors, both parent and child. This is a major parenting study based in the USA, with a unique focus on adopting parents.
