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
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Professor Evelyn Welch **'The Immaterial Renaissance'**

How do we capture the ephemeral, transitory moments of the past? Are taste, touch, sound and smell subject to the same cultural constraints and contexts as any other form of historical experience? This lecture looks at one aspect of Renaissance culture: the perfuming of material goods such as gloves, buttons, shoes and earrings, to explore the possibilities of regaining an immaterial Renaissance.

Evelyn Welch is Professor of Renaissance Studies at Queen Mary. She took her BA in Renaissance History and Literature at Harvard University and was awarded her PhD from the Warburg Institute. University of London. The author of *Shopping in the* Renaissance (Yale, 2007), Art in Renaissance Italv (Oxford. 2000) and Art and Authority in Renaissance Milan (Yale, 1995), she is a specialist in Italian Renaissance visual and material culture. She is co-editor of The Material Renaissance (Manchester. 2007), the result of a 3-year AHRB collaborative research project and is currently working on Renaissance dress in an AHRC-funded network She is the AHRC programme director for Bevond Text: Performances, Sounds, Images, Objects which will run until 2012.
