

Genetic Services for Communities Practising Cousin Marriage

A one-day conference Thursday 23rd October 2008, 9.30 am to 4.30 pm Norcroft Centre, University of Bradford

About the conference

Practised within at least 20% of communities worldwide, consanguineous marriage is an aspect of the diverse kinship patterns in multi-ethnic Britain. Linked to an increased prevalence of inherited autosomal recessive disorders, it raises issues about the nature and delivery of genetic and related health and social care services.

This conference presents, alongside other current initiatives, the findings of a qualitative study funded by the Department of Health. The study examined the potential of family networks as a resource for genetic testing and counselling in a community practising cousin marriage. Additionally, through a series of workshops, delegates will be encouraged to share their own experience and consider issues of local and national relevance.
