It will be led by members of NCRM nodes LEMMA (Learning Environment for Multilevel Methodology and Applications) and ADMIN (Administrative Data: methods inference & network) in conjunction with the Centre for Market and Public Organisation, a multidisciplinary ESRC Research Centre.
