Introduction

Thinking 'health inequalities' appears to have moved up the policy agenda. Several government initiatives such as improving GP access and increasing patient and public involvement have significant potential for promoting 'race' equality. But how much is race equality being embedded in current policy and practice? Is it a core aspect of mainstream planning or still an 'add-on'? Where there is good race equality practice, what are the drivers and skills that make it work? And how do we evaluate its success?

Conference aims

- To provide delegates with a better understanding of what it means to 'mainstream' race equality
- To enable delegates to engage with evidence of what works and what needs to change
- To assist delegates be more able to meet the requirements of equalities duties and inspections

Programme for the day

The conference will open with a panel of service users who will describe and discuss what excellent services mean to them. Panel members will include **Hellen Adom** with expertise in managing the Sickle Cell condition, **Devon Grant** with expertise in mental health services and **Nita Patel** with expertise in managing a long-term physical condition.

The panel session will be followed by two keynote addresses on aspects of mainstreaming race equality in services. The keynote speakers will invite questions and discussion throughout their presentations. Joan Saddler, OBE, Director of Patient and Public Affairs at the Department of Health; and Gurch Randhawa, Chair, NHS Luton and Professor of Diversity in Public Health and Director of the Institute for Health Research at the University of Bedfordshire, are the morning speakers.

In the afternoon, there will be two more interactive plenary sessions on further aspects of mainstreaming. **Joy Warmington** is Chief Executive of Birmingham Race Action Partnership (brap) and a Leadership Development Consultant with The Health Foundation. Professor **Helen Hally** is National Director of the Race for Health programme.

In addition, we are expecting to have a demonstration on the Specialist Library for Ethnicity and Health during the lunch break.

Delegates will receive a copy of the latest Race Equality Foundation Better Health briefing paper.

Who should attend

The conference is aimed at front line staff and managers working across the range of statutory and voluntary health care services. For example, NHS Trusts, Primary Care Trusts, health promotion, public health and the voluntary sector.

The conference will also be of interest to service users, carers, policy makers and researchers.
