

Are We Getting it Right Yet? Race Equality and Exclusion from School

A Runnymede eConference: 8 & 9 February 2010

Black Caribbean pupils are still disproportionately excluded from school. To address this and other issues around race and school exclusion Runnymede is holding a free online conference on 8 & 9 February, 2010. Participants will have the opportunity to hear from a wide range of policy and research experts in the field of 'race' and education, together with practitioners, teachers, parents and pupils.

The great benefit of an e-conference is that it enables **all** of those with an interest in the issues to add their voices and opinions over the 48-hour period.

- Diane Abbott MP will take a critical look at approaches to curb the exclusion of Black pupils
- You will be able to listen to a recorded interview with **Richard Brown**, headteacher at a school in Hackney from which no pupils have been excluded permanently over the past two years.
- Professor Carl Parsons will discuss how 'zero exclusion schools' can exist
- In a live debate Dr Tracey Reynolds will challenge Tony Sewell on his view that the negative school experiences of Black boys are related to being raised by single mothers Tuesday, 9 February @ 2pm
- You can contribute to a discussion thread on **academies**, looking at whether they are excluding more children than other types of school
