Aim of this one-day meeting

To bring people who have already experienced the view of natural inclusion together with others who are interested in finding out more and thinking about how it might be applied to their life and work. From this it is hoped that ideas will emerge about how to develop the NaturesScope programme and take it out into the wider community. What should the programme include; Where should it be presented; When and how often should it be presented; Who would like to be involved in the programme and in what way; How should the programme be resourced?

NaturesScope Co-enquiry

The intention of NaturesScope co-enquiry is to provide an opportunity for those attending to reflect and learn together not just about the living world, but from the living world.

In practical terms, it is envisaged that the co-enquiry will involve bringing people together physically or virtually into a welcoming location or 'pool' that invites them to receive, reflect upon and respond to insights offered by one another about their knowledge and experience of life in the natural world. Depending on its length, which can be anything from one or two hours to one or two days, it will cover one or more themes to do with life, environment, and people, which Alan (or any one else familiar with the approach) will introduce using poetry, art, outdoor experience and imaginative exercises as well as more conventional forms of presentation to initiate and sustain conversations amongst those present. This will be followed by conversations initiated by other participants.

Suitable topics for discussion might include:

'the meaning of natural neighbourhood' @ 'water and life' @ 'biodiversity' @ 'evolutionary creativity' @ 'living with uncertainty' @ 'love' @ 'sustainability' @ 'biotechnology' @ 'globalization' @ 'consumerism' @ 'the nature of time' @ 'climate change' @ 'conflict' @ 'conservation' @ 'modes of governance' @ 'pollution' @ 'science and religion/art/mathematics'

Summary

For thousands of years we have tried to study, interpret and teach ourselves *about* Nature from our own point of view, through the lenses of our telescopes, microscopes and binocular eyesight directed outwards. We see a rigidly framed objective picture 'out there' that does not include our selves yet upon which we project our own image and psychology.

This one-way view has brought us into profound conflict with our natural origins and one another. *NaturesScope* evokes a different view, *from* Nature, which brings human beings and the world into empathic mutual relationship. It assists us in enquiring imaginatively and creatively into how to turn the narrowed down objective worldview around and see our selves and our world through nature's fluid lens of mutual inclusion.

People who have experienced this view of natural inclusion have found it a source of profound inspiration.

Background

Alan Rayner is a naturalist who uses art, poetry, 'transfigural' mathematics and rigorous scientific observation to enquire and communicate about our natural human neighbourhood. He has been using a participatory and co-creative approach to explore his evolutionary understanding of *natural inclusion* with final year undergraduate students at the University of Bath, U.K., since 2001.

He wants to open what he has learned through this experience to others through *NaturesScope*
