Third Global Conference on Economic Geography 2011 Space, Economy and Environment 28 June - 1 July 2011, COEX, Seoul, Korea

OBJECTIVE

This conference is the continuation of the first (Singapore, 5-9 December 2000) and second (Beijing, 25-28 June 2007) successful Global Conferences on Economic Geography.
