Set in an inferior London estate, Estate Walls follows the story of Obi, a young writer who dreams of leaving. Told through rich, witty and lyrical street language, the story focuses on the young artist's conflict between his ambitions and his loyalty to his friends, who are planning a heist in which Obi refuses to take part. Meanwhile, his love for a forbidden girl adds to the complexity of his life, making him soon to enter a whole world of problems. Tickets £12/£6 concessions. Tuesday 5 - Thursday 7 October. 8pm. Britiko Identity. Short plays written by young Nigerian British playwrights, led by rising star Arinze Kene, and curated by Oladipo Agboluaje and Ben Evans. Performed by Identity Drama School Britain's first Black drama school. £5

Monday 11 October. 6pm. Pandora's Box by Ade Solanke. On holiday with her streetwise teenage son in Lagos, a British-Nigerian mother is in turmoil. Should he be on the plane back to London with her? Or should she leave her only child in a strict Lagos boarding school rather than return him to the battlefields of inner London. £5.

To 7 November. Exhibition Hydrarchy: Power and Resistance at Sea. Gasworks Gallery, 155 Vauxhall St, London, SE11. Mathieu K. Abonnenc, Goldin+Senneby, Laura Horelli, Melanie Jackson, Anja Kirschner and David Panos, Paul McCarthy, Uriel Orlow, Femmy Otten, Christodoulos Panayiotou, and João Pedro Vale. Group exhibition that approaches historical and contemporary examinations of the sea and the offshore as contested cultural, political, legal and socio-economic territories. Focusing on specific events, situations and mythologies attached to past and recent maritime history, the works address power relations at sea and the forms of resistance and survival developed as a response. Works in the exhibition include: (1) Polly II: Plan for a Revolution in Docklands (2006) a satirical fictional video loosely based on John Gay's The Beggar's Opera. The work is set in the near-future where London has been flooded, high-end high-rises are being looted, financial speculation is spiralling and the dispossessed are literally adrift. In this context, a revolution against the ruling class led by lower class Londoners and dissidents is under way. (2) The Middle Passage (2006) by Mathieu K. Abonnenc refers to the forcible journey of African people to the New World from the 16th to the 19th century, using a sequence of extracts from a range of Hollywood movies. (3) Christodoulos Panayioutou's (Untitled) Act II: The Island (2008) is part of a triptych made of folded theatre backdrops about a ship possibly departing to and returning from the European colonies. Gasworks explains that the exhibition title was revived by radical historians Peter Linebaugh and Marcus Rediker in The Many-Headed Hydra: Sailors, Slaves, Commoners, and The Hidden History of the Revolutionary Atlantic (2001). The term 'hydrarchy' is used to "designate two related developments of the late seventeenth century: the organisation of the maritime state from above.

Brycchan Carey, Reader in English Literature, Kingston University. Historians of the abolition of the slave trade have usually depicted early antislavery Quakers as 'voices crying out in the wilderness' or as outsiders whose views were at odds with the mainstream of Quaker thought. Their writings and protests, it is often argued, had 'little impact' until the 1750s when John Woolman and others brought about a transformation in Quaker attitudes to slavery. In this talk, Brycchan Carey questions this view, and argues that early Quaker discussions about slavery were more central and widespread than is often recognised.
