Museum§heffield Forging Futures: Learning Resources for Adults Call for Expressions of Interest

Background

The Forging Futures project celebrates Sheffield's leading role in metal innovation by connecting past and present traditions, and highlighting the crucial part that creativity, design and technology plays in the future of our city. We have created a handling resource to encourage more hands-on interaction and understanding of the metalwork collection.

There are 5 object handling boxes which focus on innovation, especially through design, style and use of materials, and the objects selected reflect this. They focus on Britannia Metal, Old Sheffield Plate and Stainless Steel collections, but we've also included other materials for comparison purposes. The boxes are safe and secure to be taken out of the museums for outreach work, or can be used on site. The project is funded by the Designation Development Fund (DDF).

Freelance brief

We want to appoint a freelancer(s) to develop, co-ordinate and deliver sessions for adults using the boxes. These would be aimed at an adult audience, particularly with residential homes, luncheon clubs or groups with special needs in Sheffield. Sessions would mainly happen off site (eg in residential homes), but could also include a visit to the Millennium Gallery. The object handling collection would be the starting point for reminsence, creative writing, art or other activities. The main aim is to get the collection out to adult audiences in an interesting, meaningful way. We have contact with some groups who are interested, and are happy to consider other groups too.

There is a maximum of **11 days** work available at **£200 per day** including all expenses. All sessions must be **finished by 31 March 2011**. We are happy to consider proposals for fewer days, and may appoint several people to complete discrete projects.

The freelancer(s) will be responsible for:

- planning, co-ordinating and delivering sessions
- creating a clear outline of any sessions created, ready to be used in the future
- co-ordinating any additional resources (eg refreshments, transport for groups) as agreed in advance with Museums Sheffield.
- collecting monitoring information and evaluation records
