Corruption: forms, opportunities and social outcomes. An interdisciplinary workshop.

Scholars may like it or not but in the last twenty years corruption has become one of the key notions in the social sciences. Each social science discipline has attempted to build theoretical and analytical approaches to what has recently been indicated as an "incurable disease". From these approaches increasingly detailed accounts have emerged that look at corruption from a macroscopic perspective in relation with institutional performance, quality of government, market efficiency, democracy, civil society and development. On the other hand, ethnographic and sociological studies have focused on topics as different as morality and legitimacy, social networks, informal practices, gift-exchange and bribes, discursive power, ideological reconstructions of the state, and ground level political mechanisms of choice-making. Unfortunately, apart from few scattered contributions, very little has been achieved in terms of interdisciplinary research, particular between macro and micro-level approaches.

This workshop is a small attempt to consolidate interdisciplinary approaches to the study of corruption. The notion is here dealt with through attention to formal processes, individual strategies and the generalized social outcomes of its diffusion. We believe that in order to build a constructive dialogue among disciplines as different as political science, sociology, anthropology and jurisprudence, a multidimensional approach is needed. This, ideally, looks at the delineation of different forms of corruption (in political institutions, corporate business, law and in media products) and to ground-level strategies which situate corruption as a phenomenon of large and diversified social impact.

The contributions to this workshop will constitute part of a thematic issue in the journal Human Affairs, published by Springer.
