

# Insular Economics: *Ireland in the Eleventh and Twelfth Centuries*

This one-day workshop is dedicated to exploring an overlooked element of the history and archaeology of Early Medieval Ireland, its economies, economics and their wider Insular contexts, during the eleventh and twelfth centuries. Papers by early career researchers - working in a number of different fields - will explore topics such as numismatics, exchange networks, administrative documentary traditions, settlements, environmental impact and the application of theoretical economic models.

This inter-disciplinary workshop - jointly hosted by the Department of Anglo-Saxon, Norse & Celtic and the McDonald Institute for Archaeological Research - will be hosted in the McDonald Institute, University of Cambridge, on Saturday 10th September.
