Professor Peter Otto (University of Melbourne) teaches and researches in the literatures and cultures of modernity, from Romanticism to the new media of today. His recent publications include *Blake's Critique of Transcendence* (2000; OUP, 2006); *Gothic Fiction, a microfilm collection of Gothic novels published between 1764 and 1830* (Adam Matthew, 2002-3); *Gothic Fiction: A Guide* (Adam Matthew 2003), and *Entertaining the Supernatural: Mesmerism, Spiritualism, Secular Magic and Psychic Science* (Adam Matthew, 2007; digital edition 2008). He is consultant editor of Adam Matthew's 'Victorian Popular Culture' portal (2008). His new monograph, *Multiplying Worlds: Romanticism, Modernity and the Emergence of Virtual Reality* (OUP, 2011), uncovers a key stage in the development of modern discourses of virtual reality. He is currently completing a book on Gothic Fictions and Imagined Worlds and has begun work on a new edition of Blake's poetry to be published by OUP.
