Unique as the northern most outcrop of chalk the Yorkshire Wolds are defined by their dramatic escarpment, rolling hills, big skies and hidden valleys. Their historic environment, biodiversity and aesthetic value are implicitly linked to its landscape character. The Wolds are passionately valued by the people and communities that live, work and manage them, and those who come to explore.

In spring 2012 the Heritage Lottery Fund will launch its new look Landscape Partnership Programme. Over 40 diverse landscapes across the UK have benefited from funding of between £250,000 and £2 million for schemes designed to conserve areas of distinctive landscape character.

This event will highlight how landscapes similar to the Wolds have benefited from the HLF LP Programme, and act as a first step towards developing a Wolds Landscape Partnership with the potential to deliver a Wolds Landscape Partnership scheme.

Speakers include Robin Gray from the Pennines Watershed Landscape Project and David Mount co-author of the 2011 HLF LP Programme national assessment.
