Continuous scrutiny of urban challenges of the great cities is not really a choice; it is a bare necessity.

The Journal of Space Syntax would like to invite you to submit your original papers on four major categories of urban challenges:

- 1. The 'unplanned challenge': informal settlements, urban villages, urban sprawl, rural growth
- 2. The 'deprivation challenge': slums, favelas, shanty towns
- 3. The 'heritage challenge': historic cores, traditional urbanism, urban conservation
- 4. The 'planned-cities challenge': New Towns, modern developments, planned systems

A major focus of this issue is on how analytical methods and analysis might help develop a deeper understanding of urban challenges. The approaches of the papers could be: theoretical, methodological developments, tools/ techniques of urban investigation, data handling/mapping, design and interventions. The articles have to be based on high-end, rigorous and previously unpublished research. The use of space syntax methods is a desirable feature, but other methods and approaches are equally welcomed.
