Conference Growing Towards Recovery Fri 12 July and Sat 13 July 2013

There is a growing body of evidence that greencare and ecotherapy interventions have a positive impact on mental health and social inclusion. This conference aims to make explicit different and contrasting mental health models, service structures, and their outcomes in greencare settings. This is the first national conference to address the theoretical and applied ideas that contribute to this effective way of addressing mental health problems and associated social exclusion. This residential conference will stimulate a lively debate about what works and why, and how to apply the evidence in your own setting.

The conference will cover

- Models from the NHS, voluntary sector and farm-based initiatives, from urban and rural settings.
- Greencare with people with psychosis, borderline personality disorder, medically unexplained symptoms; ADHD, Asperger's Syndrome and Oppositional Defiance Disorder.
- Projects with non-English speaking communities, vulnerable adults, young people and those whose mental health issues coincide with learning and behavioural difficulties.
- Social enterprises, therapeutic groups, educational settings and working farm participation.
- How to engage and sustain engagement with hard to reach groups, including people with psychosis.
- Facilitated application discussion groups after presentations enable participants to think actively about how to apply the models and ideas in your own diverse settings.
- Capturing outcomes to ensure commissioners know and understand the impact of these significant and sometimes life-changing interventions.
- Visiting a working farm and Grow2Grow, Commonwork's mental health and recovery project for young people.
