European architects and the rediscovery of Etruria in the 19th century: from Sir John Soane to Charles Garnier

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The rediscovery of ancient Etruria had a major impact on the development of archaeology and cultural history in the 19th century. The newly

discovered monuments, including the painted tombs of Tarquinia and the rich cemeteries of Vulci, intrigued English, French and German architects. Their drawings preserve invaluable information about monuments since lost or damaged, and provide a key to understanding the evolution of modern taste in European architecture and culture.


