We anticipate the successful candidate will be able to join us at the end of July 2014 and commit to 10 weeks due to end at the end of September/ beginning of October 2014. This is an ideal opportunity for an individual to develop their project management skills in a heritage context whilst being able to demonstrate individual initiative and be self-motivated.

Background and purpose of the role

The Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) provides funding for a wide range of organisations to undertake First World War Centenary projects. Projects include activities such as researching, identifying and recording local heritage; creating a community archive or collection; developing new interpretation of heritage through exhibitions, trails, websites etc.; conserving a war memorial; and researching, writing and performing creative material based on heritage sources. HLF is working in partnership with Historypin to create a First World War Centenary Hub on Historypin (<u>www.historypin.com</u>) to enable organisations to share their projects on an online map.

By registering with the Hub, projects will be able to set up their own page, to record their project activity and to share heritage material via a map. They will also be able to invite others to explore and contribute to this map. The Hub will draw all these projects and materials together, enabling the public to explore First World War activities in their local area and connect directly to opportunities to participate online and offline.

The Hub is currently under development and will be ready for projects to add material at the end of July 2014. HLF and Historypin will be showcasing the Hub in October, which will require it to be populated with Centenary projects and heritage material.

The purpose of this role is to encourage and support First World War projects in 6-10 selected areas across the UK to populate the Historypin First World War Centenary Hub with project information and heritage material. The role demands enthusiasm, flexibility, good interpersonal skills and commitment.

Main duties

You will be responsible for ensuring that the Historypin First World War Centenary Hub is populated with projects and heritage material in 6-10 selected areas of the UK. You will do this by directly supporting all HLF-funded First World War projects in those areas, and as many non HLF-funded projects as possible, to set up a project, upload content and curate materials on Historypin. Direct support is likely to include:

• Promoting the benefits of the Historypin FWW Centenary Hub to projects, and suggesting how they can best make use of it.

- Clearly setting out and leading projects through the necessary steps required to join the Hub.
- Providing phone and email support, and practical advice, to projects that need assistance using the Hub.
- Explaining and providing advice on copyright in order that projects can share heritage assets.
- Editing copy and sourcing images where necessary.

You may be required to provide support to groups of projects by running workshops or training events.

You will work in collaboration with Historypin's FWW Centenary Community Officer.

Person specification

- 1. Friendly and personable, with the ability to enthuse, motivate and communicate effectively with a wide range of people.
- 2. Interested in supporting local First World War community projects.
- 3. Well organised and able to plan and manage own workload, with the determination to achieve tasks to a deadline.
- 4. Excellent IT and digital skills, including the use of websites such as Historypin.
- 5. Ability to explain and guide people less familiar with digital technology through using Historypin.
- 6. Excellent written and verbal communication skills, including presentation skills.
- 7. Understanding of equality and diversity particularly in the context of this role's remit to support HLF's corporate objective to increase diversity in grant giving, governance and the workforce.
- 8. Availability to commit to a 10 week placement and see the project through to completion.

Training

You will be provided with training and support to:

- 1. Use the First World War Centenary Hub on Historypin.
- 2. Understand basic copyright information relevant to the project.
- 3. Provide basic technical support and guidance for HLF project leaders.
