'Fundamentals in history teaching ... without losing the Fun' Ben Walsh is Associate Vice

President of the Historical Association

The revised NC History orders, new A Levels, strengthened GCSEs and new GCSEs over the horizon all promise a renewed focus on the fundamentals of good history: engaging narrative, students developing a broad overview; students wrestling with historical concepts; students building knowledge which they then apply in an argument. Most teachers will recognise that these movements are driven by the desire of teachers more than the strictures of policy or examination. In this session Ben will look at the importance of these fundamental elements of history and consider how they are being tackled by practitioners in ways which challenge but also engage. Be prepared for a Viking raid, to monitor the heart rate of a significant politician, to assess an assassin and a few other peculiar tasks ...
