



Workshop on Desistance Processes among Young Offenders following Judicial Interventions – Bridging the Gap between different theoretical and methodological Approaches

Freiburg im Breisgau, Germany – 31 March to 1 April 2016

The purpose of the workshop organized by the Max Planck Institute for Foreign and International Criminal Law (MPICC) is to give some insight into the subjective ways young offenders experience judicial interventions and their transition into a life towards desistance. Thereby different theoretical and methodological approaches are being considered and discussed.

Scope

The workshop covers three interdisciplinary topics. In each thematic area experts will address current issues and set the tone for in-depth discussion.

- 1. Social approaches
- 2. Subjective approaches
- 3. Interaction models

Paper Submission

Authors are invited to submit original, unpublished research papers. Submissions should state the research contribution and the relevance to the workshop. Submissions should consist of an abstract (app. 350 words) and a short biography (app. 150 words). Submissions are welcome until August 21st. Authors whose abstracts match the scope of the conference will be informed by October 1st.

All abstracts and biographies will be made available to participants prior to the workshop. Accepted papers will be included in the workshop transcript published as a book by Duncker & Humblot, Berlin, in the interdisciplinary series of the Max Planck Institute for Foreign and International Criminal Law.
