### **EVENT SPEAKERS (Keynote):**



Phyll Opoku-Gyimah (AKA Lady Phyll)
Head of Equality and Learning at PCS the Union
UK Black Pride Executive Director

Phyll (she/her) is the nucleus of the award-winning celebration and protest that is UK Black Pride. Widely known as Lady Phyll – partly due to her decision to reject an MBE in the New Year's Honours' list to protest Britain's role in formulating anti-LGBT penal codes across its empire – she is the Head of Equality & Learning for Public and Commercial Services (PCS) trade union as well as a community builder and organiser; a Stonewall Trustee; Diva Magazine columnist, and public speaker focusing on 'race, gender sexuality and class' intersectionality. Phyll has been nominated for and won numerous accolades including the European Diversity Awards Campaigner of the Year in 2017, she is also in the World Pride 100 Power List at number 2.

Phyll is also the co-editor and author of the 'Sista' Anthology, writing by and about same gender loving women of African Caribbean descent with a UK connection. She is also a Diva Columnist, has been a Stonewall Trustee and has also worked with the TUC equality committees.

Phyll is a working class, family-orientated Ghanaian woman who understands the Twi and Fanti languages which connect her to a rich African cultural heritage that advocates for unity and equality. She also prides herself on being a passionate activist who commits to working diligently to make people aware of on-going inequalities and injustices facing the Black LGBT+ community. She has worked tirelessly to build up UK Black Pride by bringing together artists, activists, volunteers and supporters from across the LGBT+ community. Phyll supports Paris Black Pride and ensures UK Black Pride is part of the International Federation of Black Prides around the world. Phyll cites her maxim as a quotation from Maya Angelou: 'prejudice is a burden that confuses the past, threatens the future and renders the present inaccessible'

### **EVENT SPEAKERS (Event Chair):**



**Dr. Emma Vickers** (Event Chair & Senior Lecturer Humanities and Social Science, LJMU)

Emma is a senior lecturer in History at Liverpool John Moores University. Her first monograph, *Queen and Country: Same Sex Desire in the British Armed Forces*, 1939-1945 (MUP 2013) explores the intersection between same-sex desire and service in the British Armed Forces during the Second World War.

Emma has published articles in the Lesbian Studies Journal (2009) Feminist Review (2010) and The Oral History Review (2019). She is

currently working on outputs stemming from Dry Your Eyes Princess, a project which used oral testimony to uncover the experiences of trans\* personnel in the British Armed Forces before 2000. Following an award from the Arts Council, Emma worked with the photographer Stephen King on a series of photographs of her interviewees which were exhibited as part of Homotopia in Liverpool and Outburst in Belfast.

Emma has worked with the BBC and collaborated with various museums and external organisations including the Ministry of Defence, Reading Museum and the Historical Association. She is an academic advisor for the National Festival of LGBT History, a fellow of the Higher Education Academy and an active member of the Oral History Society's LGBTQ special interest group. In 2017 she was awarded the prestigious Vice Chancellor's award for social and economic engagement.

### Chief Inspector Karen Wiesenekker (Merseyside Police)

Chief Inspector Karen Wiesenekker has been a police officer for 27 years and is currently managing the introduction of Policing Education Qualifications Framework which will see some significant changes for entry into policing and will afford police officers with opportunities to professionalise via academic qualifications.

Karen is also the Staff Officer to ACC Julie Cooke from Merseyside who is the National Police Chief's Council lead for LGBT+.

Karen has previously worked as the lead for Equality and Diversity with Staff Support Networks, Equality Objectives and Positive Action as a primary focus.

Karen has also previously been the Chair of the Merseyside Black Police Association and throughout her career has championed equity and fairness for officers and staff with protected characteristics.

### **Lucy Day** (Former Liverpool Pride Chair)

Lucy is an Impact Officer for Research and Innovation Services at LJMU, Lucy received the Citizenship Award for her volunteer work with Liverpool Pride. Lucy played a major role in helping to shape Liverpool's LGBT community and its place in the wider Merseyside community.

Lucy's role as a Trustee and Chair of the Board saw her placed in strategic decision-making positions within the organisation – responsible for the charity governance and overseeing the delivery of the event.

Lucy has been instrumental in growing the size, reputation and meaning of the event. She successfully provided both leadership and stability in a challenging funding landscape, helping to raise £100,000 per year through fundraising and sponsorship to put on the event. Her work not only had a positive impact on the city but also helped to change the lives of the thousands of people within the local LGBT community for the better.

**Nick Medforth** (Senior Lecturer School of Nursing and Allied Health, LJMU)

Nick has a professional background in Adult and Children's Nursing having trained at Alder Hey Children's Hospital in Liverpool and the Hospital for Sick Children, Great Ormond Street in London. He has worked as a Charge Nurse on a Dialysis Unit for Children and Young People and as a Nurse Specialist for Paediatric Haematology and HIV.

Nick has also worked as a Youth Worker in a Sexual Health Service for Young People in Merseyside and has been seconded to Government Office for the North West where he was Implementation Lead for a Department of Health Project across Cumbria and Lancashire aimed at improving the accessibility and quality of Health

Services for Young People. He has also been a volunteer Telephone Counsellor for ChildLine North West for several years.

Nick's previous role as Associate Dean (Quality Assurance and Enhancement) enabled him to combine academic teaching, professional leadership with contribution to the work of the management team of the Faculty of Education, Health and Community. He had lead responsibility for assuring and enhancing quality across its provision. This role also involves contributing to the assurance and enhancement at a University level as well as other strategic developments.

Nick is currently Programme Leader for the Advanced Paediatric Practitioner programme at LJMU and he also teaches on the BA (Hons) Health and Social Care for Individuals, Families and Communities. Nick also works as a self-employed Advocate for Children and Young People on behalf of Liverpool City Council. He volunteers as a Diversity Role Model.




