BLOOMSBURY ADVANCES IN ECOLINGUISTICS

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Bloomsbury Advances in Ecolinguistics emerges at a time when businesses, unions, universities and national governments are declaring an ecological emergency. With climate change and biodiversity loss diminishing the ability of the Earth to support life, this new series explores the role that linguistics can play in addressing the great challenges faced by humanity and countless other species. The series treats language as an intrinsic part of both human societies and wider ecosystems and explores what different areas of linguistic enquiry, such as discourse analysis, corpus linguistics, language diversity and cognitive linguistics, can become at a time of ecological emergency.

Books in the series explore a) emerging theoretical frameworks such as Harmonious Discourse Analysis, b) the relationship between linguistic diversity and biodiversity, c) the use of linguistic analysis in ecocriticism and other ecological humanities and d) the stories that underpin unequal and unsustainable industrial societies. The books also look to cultures around the world for inspirational forms of language that can lead to new stories to live by. In this way, the series contributes to linguistic theory by placing language fully in its social and ecological context, and to practical action by showing how linguistics can play a role in the transition to an ecological civilisation.
