The Unit Economic Geography in the Institute of Geography, University of Bern, invites applications for the following position, which will start on November 1, 2020:

Post Doc in Economic Geography (SNF Project Industrial Towns)

The full-time position is part of an international research project on industrial towns in Switzerland and Slovenia. The 3-year project is funded through the Swiss National Science Foundation ("Places that don't matter? Socio-economic transformation of industrial towns in Switzerland and Slovenia", SNF grant number 192764). The Slovenian Science Foundation is funding additional positions that are based at the Anton Melik Geographical Institute in Ljubljana. The project is led by Prof. Dr. Heike Mayer in Bern and Dr. David Bole in Ljubljana. Both are experts on the development of small and medium-sized towns.

For this project, we will examine industrial transformation processes in small and medium-sized towns. We will analyze how these processes play out at the firm/sector level and how they affect communities (workers, families, civic society, etc.). Taking current crises such as Covid-19 into account, we will examine its impact on industrial culture, innovation dynamics and community response. We will conduct case studies in Switzerland and utilize qualitative and participatory research methods. In addition to the Post Doc, we will also hire a PhD. The Post Doc will be able to co-supervise. The researchers will collaborate with our Slovenian research partners from the Anton Melik Geographical Institute in Ljubljana and have the opportunity to participate in joint workshops and visiting research stays in Slovenia.

We offer a stimulating and team-based work environment, which provides opportunities to present at national and international conferences and workshops, network with scholars and practitioners and develop skills in advanced research methods, analysis and writing, teamwork and leadership.

Applicants should hold a recent PhD in geography or related fields or be close to finishing their doctoral thesis. The successful candidate has demonstrated her or his potential to conduct high-quality research through publications or working papers suitable for publication in international journals. The successful candidate is expected to guide the SNF-funded project and to independently conduct academic and policy-relevant research and to collaborate in research and teaching activities. We will be using participatory methods and social skills are very important. Travel to reputable international conferences is encouraged and covered by a dedicated budget. A sound command of oral and written English is mandatory; knowledge of German, French or Italian is considered a plus.

- Conducting research for a doctoral dissertation related to the research project
- Supporting the group's teaching and administrative activities

- Candidates for the Post Doc position should hold a doctoral degree in geography or in a closely related discipline (economics, socioeconomics, sociology, history, etc.).
- Candidates should be able to conduct fieldwork using methods of social science analysis. Experiences in economic geography research and methods are an asset.
- Excellent language skills in English. German, French or Italian are a plus.
